Statement of Conviction Regarding

Marriage, Divorce, and Remarriage

Likely the most precious and profound of human relationships in this fallen world is that between a man and a woman in marriage. Established by God for the purpose of complementary companionship¹, chaste sexual intimacy², and procreation³, it is a covenant union of two human beings whereby the two become one flesh⁴. Through this union, and the family that it produces, marriage forms a special means whereby humans reflect, as God's image bearers, the relationship that is intrinsic to God's triune nature⁵. Marriage is defined by creation and the law of God to be a legal and moral joining of only one man to only one woman for the duration of their mutual earthly lives⁶. A Christian is to willfully and knowingly marry only another Christian⁷. Christian marriage, when lived in love and respect, becomes a portrait of the bond between Christ and His church⁸. As such, marriage is to be cherished, nurtured, and guarded with great attention and reliance upon the Holy Spirit.

Divorce, which constitutes the fracture and destruction of this most special of human ties, is hated by God⁹. Every effort should be made to prevent it from occurring. Nevertheless, there are specific sinful situations that may befall a Christian which warrant divorce. The first is physical sexual immorality by one's spouse, believer or unbeliever in Christ¹⁰. The second is desertion by an unbelieving spouse¹¹. In both cases, divorce should be considered only when all reasonable means to repair and restore the marriage relationship have been attempted. Though less clear in Scripture, a possible third situation warranting divorce is persistent unrepentant physical abuse.¹² Divorce for any other reason constitutes adultery, or unfaithfulness to the marriage covenant.

In the case where a spouse who professes to be a follower of Christ deserts a Christian, the church should follow the course of discipline and restoration, laid out by Christ, toward the deserting spouse¹³. If the deserting spouse remains unrepentant, refusing to return, he or she should be treated as an unbeliever, and the faithful spouse is not bound but is free to divorce and remarry. Remarriage is permitted in the case of the death of a spouse¹⁴, and following divorce for reasons of sexual immorality or desertion by an unbelieving spouse.

By the grace of God, the leadership of LifePointe Church of Fort Collins will strive to esteem and honor marriage; teach the congregation biblical principles about a joyful, thriving, and Christ-honoring marriage; provide biblical training and guidance for couples considering marriage; counsel and support marriage relationships to prevent divorce and to chart a course for marital success; discipline and restore offending spouses when necessary; and guide church members in discerning when legitimate grounds for divorce are present and in a healthy process of remarriage.
